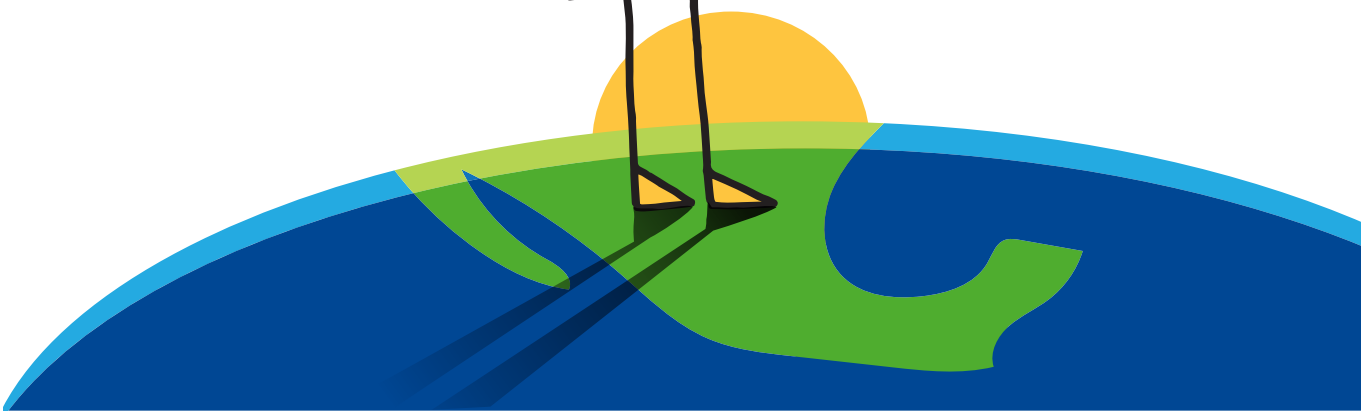

Message from the President of Sempra Infrastructure for Mexico

At Fundación Sempra Infraestructura, our commitment is to improve the quality of life of the people in the communities where we operate. The COVID-19 pandemic that people around the world have endured has led us to reaffirm our commitment to act swiftly and effectively in line with our value to do the right thing. In the last two years we allocated more than half of the Fundación Sempra Infraestructura's budget to those most affected by the pandemic.

This report covers our results for the 2021 fiscal year. During the year, Fundación Sempra Infraestructura supported 38 projects and 25 organizations directly benefitting thousands of people in 20 states of Mexico.

In the year, Fundación Sempra Infraestructura made donations worth Mx\$32.98 million pesos, with Mx\$20 million pesos allocated to help mitigate the effects of COVID-19 hand-in-hand with three organizations in two areas of focus: medical protection equipment and supplies and food security.

While we continued to help with pandemic assistance, this year we resumed the support of new projects through our annual funding efforts.

I particularly want to thank our employees. Despite having to deal with their own situations during this pandemic, they have made the foundation's causes their own by participating actively in initiatives that improve the lives of those most in need.

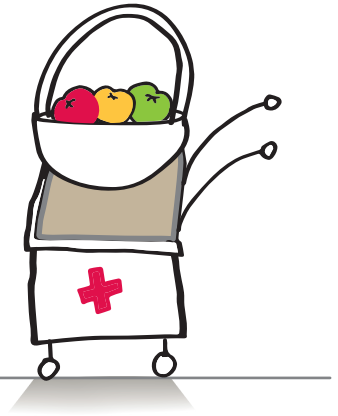

Sempre Infrastructure was created at the end of 2021 through the consolidation of two world-class infrastructure companies - Sempra LNG and Infraestructura Energética Nova, S.A.P.I. de C.V. (IEnova). The combined strength of these companies was organized into three business platforms: clean power, energy networks and LNG and net-zero solutions. We seek out opportunities that provide the ability to work towards the global energy transition.^[1]

At Sempra Infrastructure, we continue our commitment to contribute to the well-being of the people in the communities where we operate.

To fulfill this commitment, in April 2015 we created our Foundation, which is registered as a second-tier foundation duly authorized to make donations and economic contributions in compliance with the requirements set forth by the Mexican tax authority, Servicio de Administración Tributaria, (SAT).




We are focused on supporting programs that offer greater medium- and long-term benefits to the community based on four lines of action:

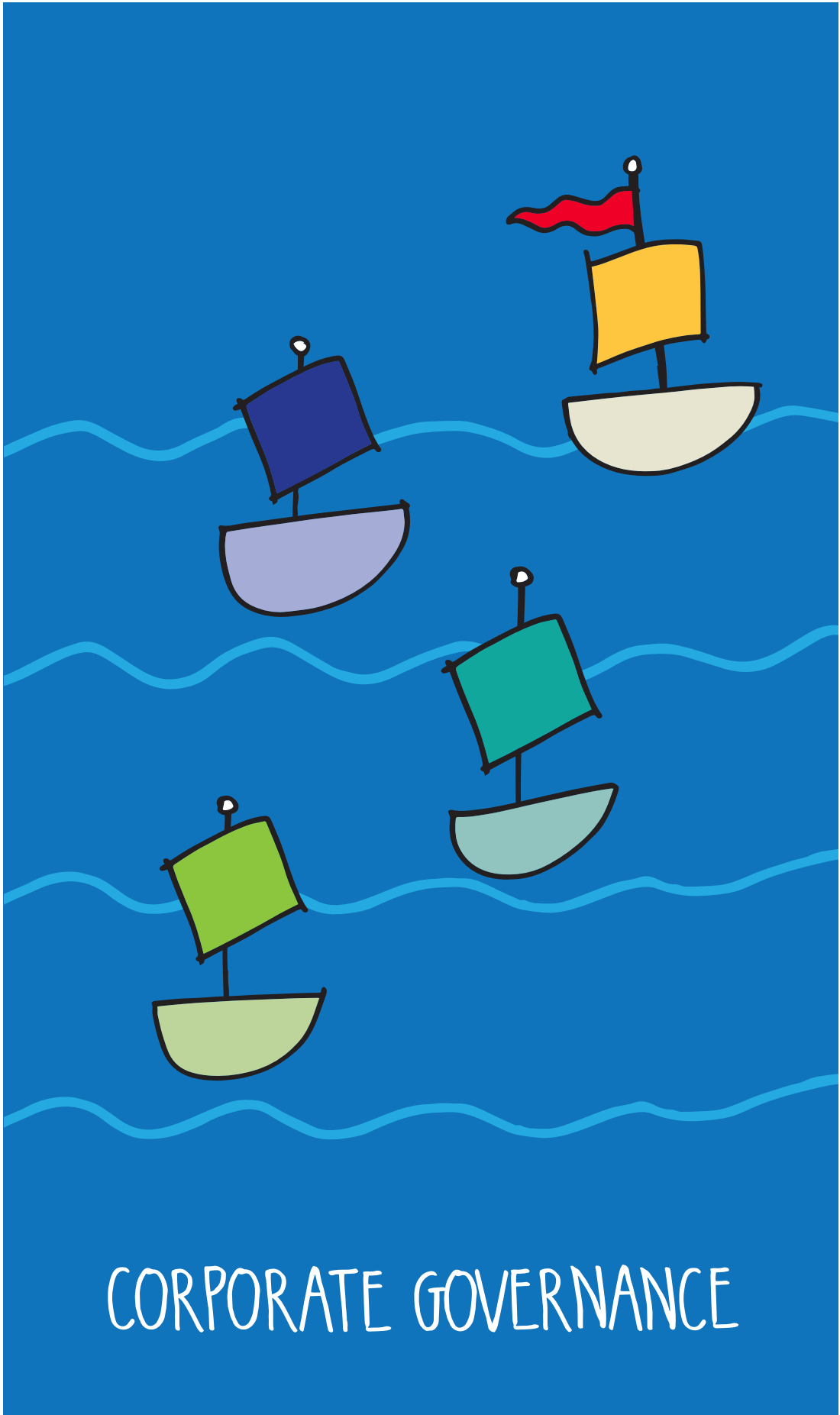


In 2021, our donations focused on two purposes:

*With the COVID-19 pandemic affecting Mexico and the world, a significant part of our budget was allocated to help those affected by the pandemic in two areas of focus: medical protection equipment and, supplies and food security.

*A portion of the budget was allocated to support multi-annual projects through our annual grants. Donations were given to projects related to the following programs:

-  • Scholarships for talented university students who need help to continue with their studies.
-  • Electrification improvement using clean power at shelters and community centers for vulnerable groups.
-  • Infrastructure improvements at shelters and vulnerable groups' attention centers.
-  • Integral support in the treatment of children with cancer.

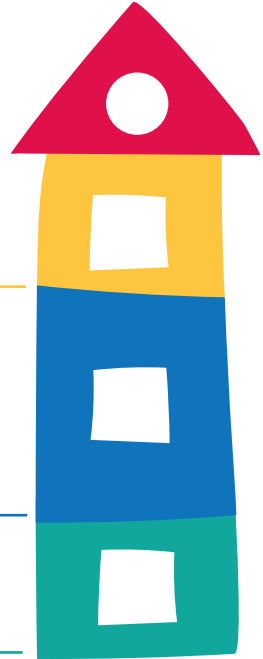

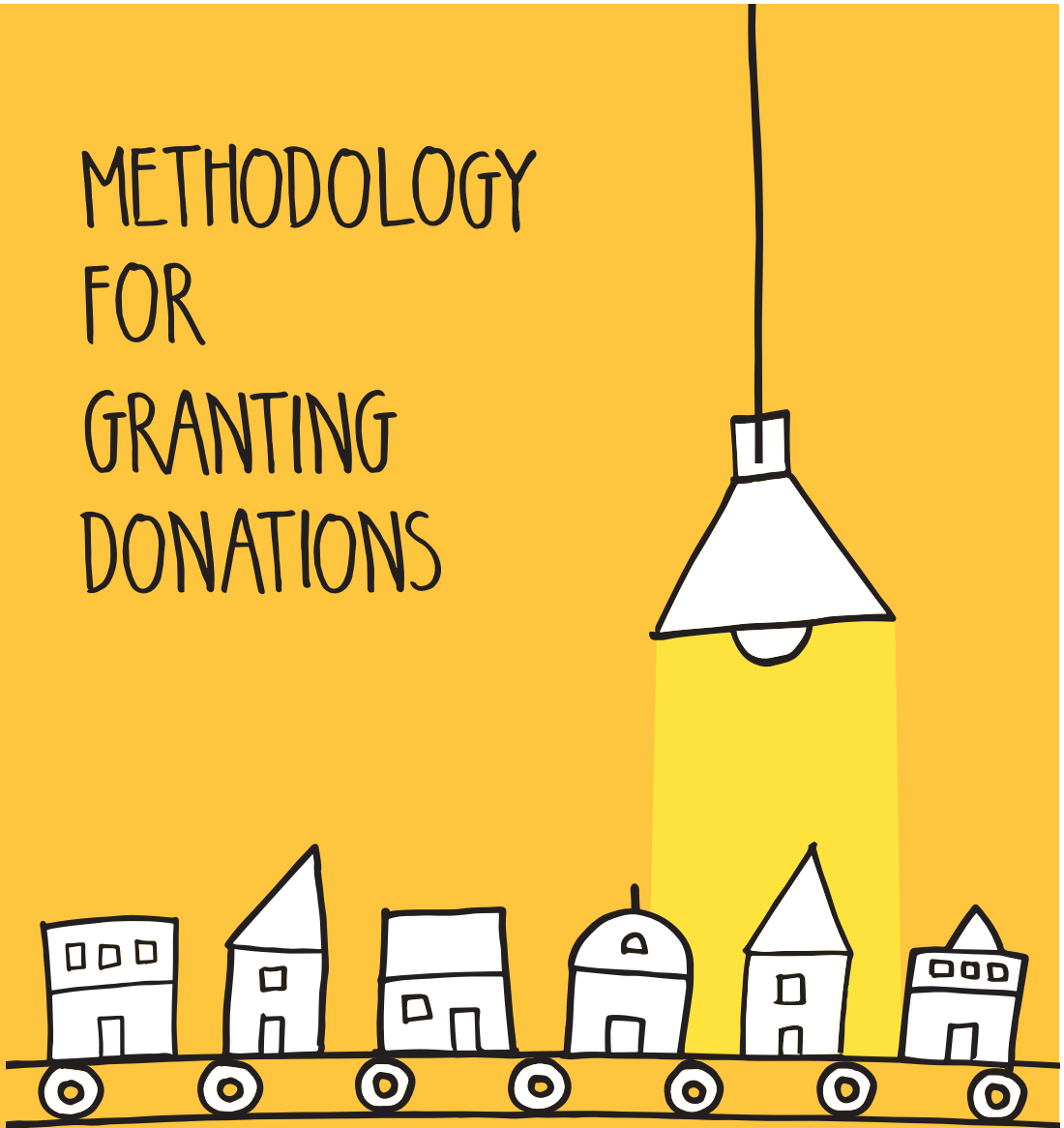

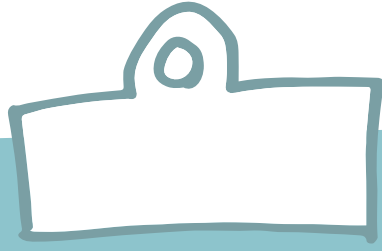
METHODOLOGY FOR GRANTING DONATIONS



The organizations supported by Fundación Sempra Infraestructura must be non-profit authorized by Mexico's Tax Administration Service (SAT) and perform activities in line with the priority programs and/or corporate purpose described in Fundación Sempra Infraestructura's Bylaws.

Organizations are invited to send us their projects via our annual grant solicitation. Submissions go through a structured review process to assess the project and organization.

In addition to being able to award donations transparently, the grant process enables us to maximize the effectiveness of the funds.

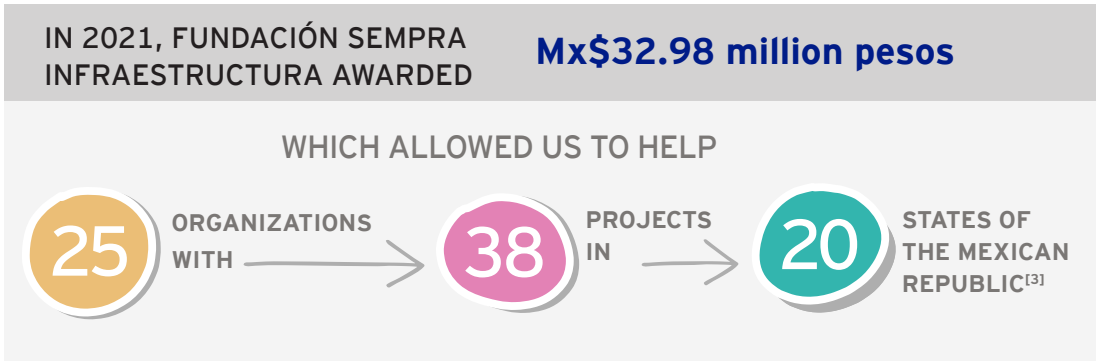

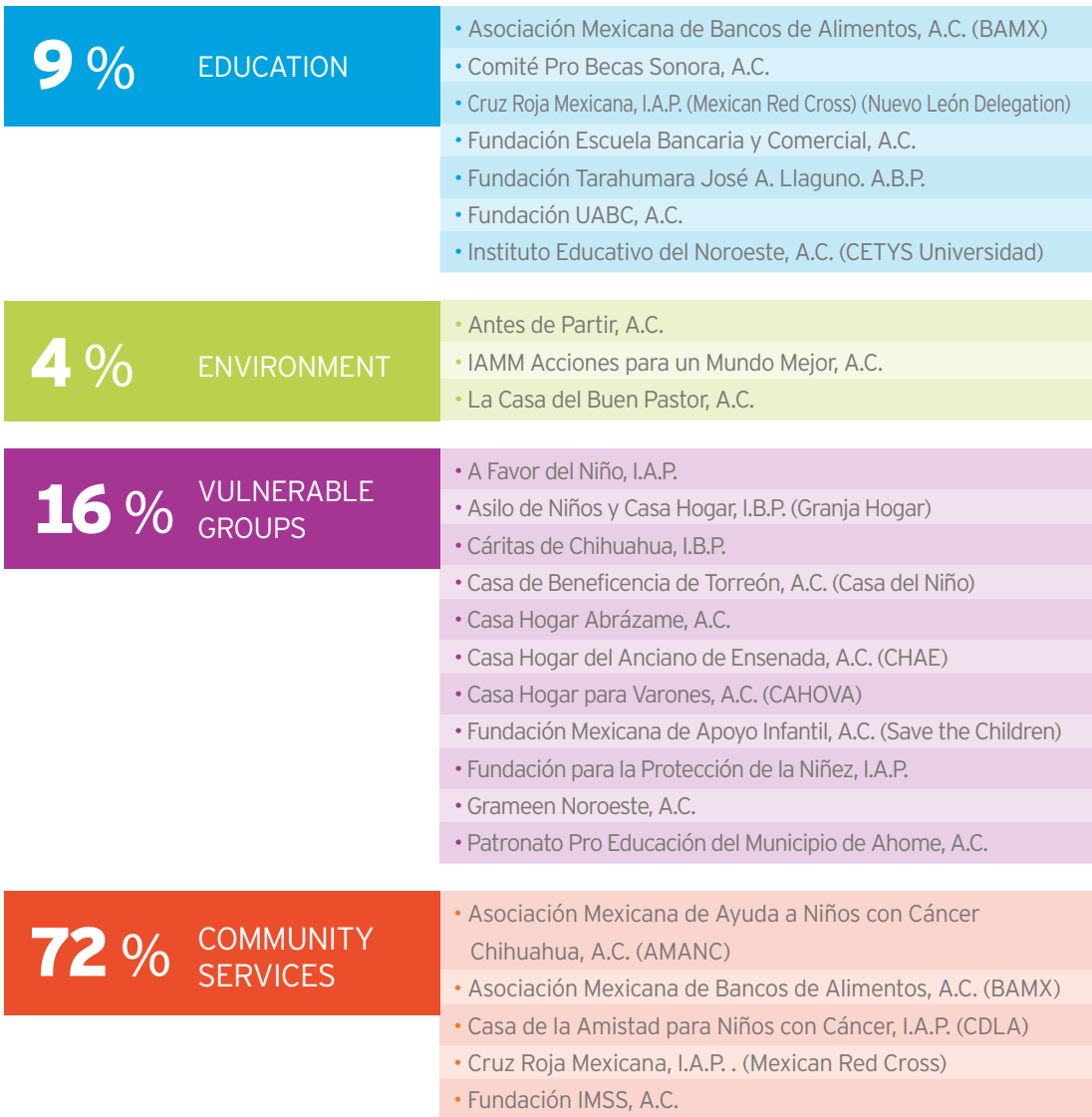

DONATIONS AWARDED IN 2021

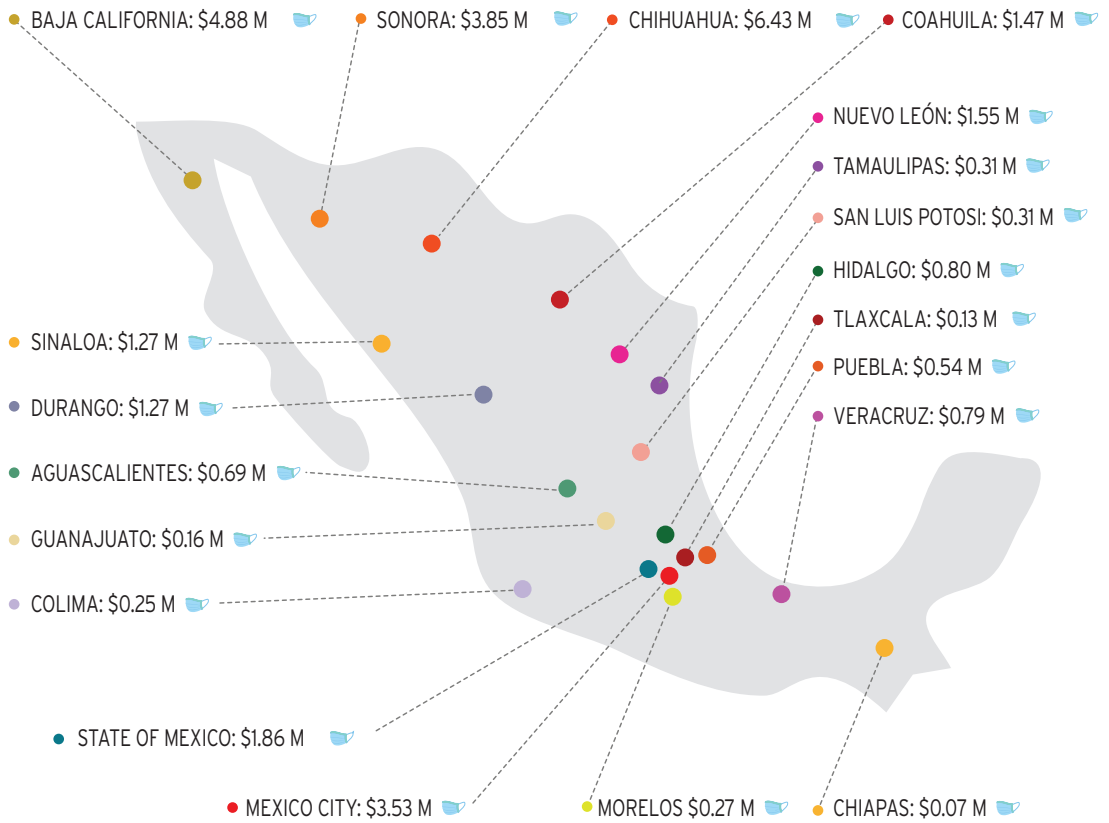


Distribution of donations by line of action 2021

Fundación Sempra Infraestructura's response to COVID-19

In 2021, our support actions to help mitigate the effects of COVID-19 continued as part of the Community Services line.

We allied with **3** organizations in **2** lines of action:



Medical protection equipment and supplies in the amount of Mx\$15.05 million pesos delivering an estimated 49,955 units in 18 states (including 1 ambulance, Tyvek suits, oxygen concentrators, oximeters, N95 face masks, goggles, Dermacare protection overalls, laryngoscopes and vital signs monitors).



Food security in the amount of Mx\$4.95 million pesos delivering approximately 11,807 provisions packages in 14 states.

IMPACT GENERATED IN 2021

In 2021 we implemented both multi-annual projects and programs to help fight against the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic in our communities and other emergency support programs, such as the floods in Hidalgo.

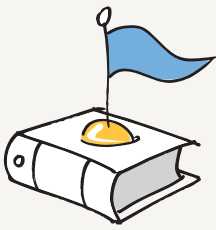
Fundación Sempra Infraestructura in Summary



Since our creation, we have completed projects in the amount of Mx\$145,118,914, and achieving mainly the following results per line:



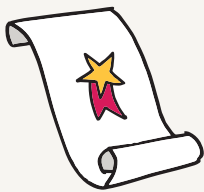
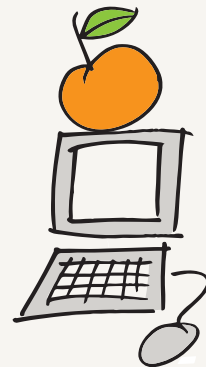
Education



Mx\$30,450,298 have been allocated to help 2,047 beneficiaries. In the framework of the “Education Scholarships for Talented Youngsters”, 30% of the total amount has been allocated to education scholarships and maintenance. Also, Mx\$1,000,000 was allocated to international high school scholarships, benefitting 13 young Mexicans.



Of the total amount allocated to scholarships, 250 have been awarded at the university level, 34 of which helped students study abroad, 75 were maintenance scholarships and 51 students were assisted to complete courses and certifications as programmers.



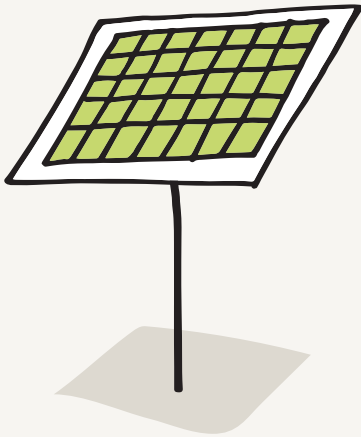
2 students received the Generational Scholarship of the Instituto Educativo del Noroeste, A.C. (CETYS Universidad) to assist during their entire university career.

117 CETYS and UABC students who received a scholarship from Fundación Sempra Infraestructura graduated. The CETYS and UABC students achieved an employment rate of 91% and 65% and recorded a positive income differential in terms of the zone of 53% and 67%, respectively.



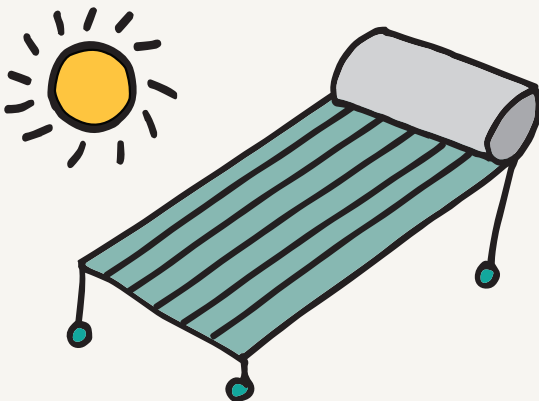
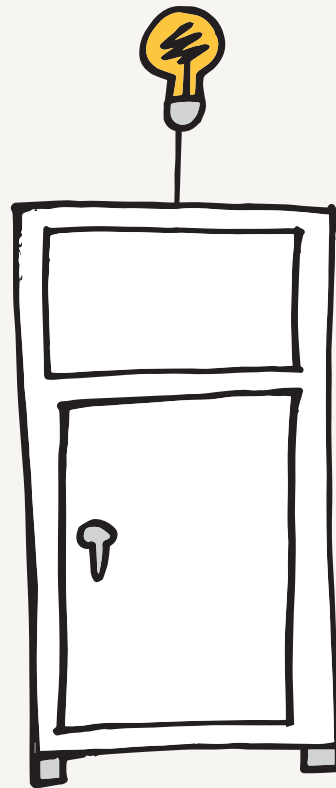


Environment



Donations of **Mx\$9,482,953** have been awarded to environmental projects, of which **71%** have been allocated for solar panel and solar heater installation projects.

Since 2017, **8** organizations have been assisted under the framework of the "Infrastructure Improvements Focused on Electrification Using Clean Energies Program" for the installation of **576** solar panels and **15** solar kits (**330 W** solar cells, energy-saving light bulbs and refrigerators), resulting in avoidance of **170 tCO²** of GEG emissions.



12 solar heaters were installed in 2019, benefited Casa Hogar del Anciano de Ensenada, A.C.

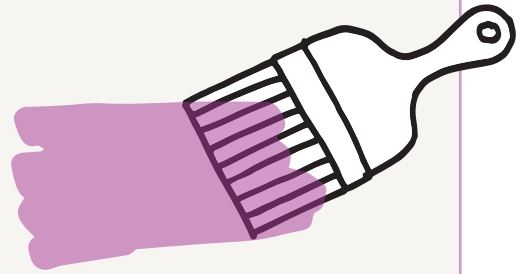

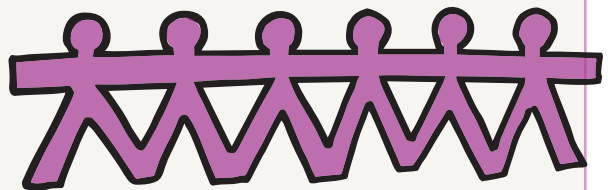
21 organizations have received a total of **Mx\$19,574,977**, allocated to infrastructure improvements in shelters and attention centers, benefiting more than **50,000** people.

Thanks to the infrastructure improvement programs, more than **12,000 m²** of constructed and/or refurbished areas have been recorded.



The beneficiaries of the “Tri-annual Shelter Program for Infrastructure Improvements,” implemented with Fundación para la Protección de la Niñez, I.A.P, have improved their quality of life by reporting a prevalence rate (on-hereditary diseases recorded in relation to the total of the population) of **15%**, decreasing year-over-year and have dedicated **35** minutes on average daily to health attention and/or follow-up.

731 volunteers have participated in activities and events, including School + Smiles and the Tree of Smiles.



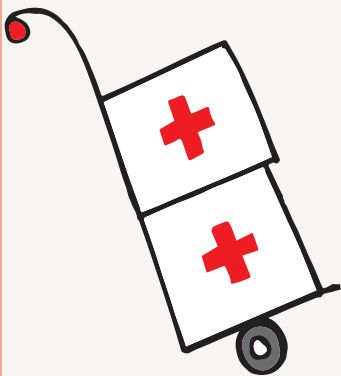


Community Services



In the Community Services line, a total of **Mx\$85,610,686** has been allocated, helping beneficiaries with the delivery of provisions, daily meals in shelters, integral support in medications and studies for children with cancer, medical supplies, the fitting out of ambulances, among others. **75%** of the total amount donated in the line was allocated to COVID-19 projects.

As part of the “Integral Support in the Treatment of Children with Cancer Program”, **980** children have received support for their studies and medications since 2017. In the framework of our Program, at least **5%** of the total expenditure of their treatment has been covered hand in hand with the Casa de la Amistad para Niños con Cáncer, I.A.P. (CDLA) and the Asociación Mexicana de Ayuda a Niños con Cáncer, A.C. (AMANC).



Mx\$18,632,767 have been allocated for the delivery of more than **60,000** provisions packs, considering those to assist with food security due to COVID-19, those of the Winter Plan we run every year with the Cruz Roja Mexicana, I.A.P. (Mexican Red Cross) in the Sierra Tarahumara and other organizations benefited by supporting more than **260,000** people.

262,788 meals have been provided in shelters and attention centers for children and/or adults in vulnerable situations.
