It is with great pride for all of us who are part of Semptra Infrastructure –and especially for the Semptra Infrastructure Foundation– to present this report, which is a reflection not only of our achievements in 2025, but also a decade of commitment, lessons learned and transformation.

We began 2025 with a clearly-defined mission: **consolidate a foundation able to drive strategic social investments and to specifically contribute to the development of the communities to which we belong.** Ten years later, with accrued social investments totaling in **\$335 million pesos**, we can proudly say we have followed the right path.

Throughout these ten years, the work of our Foundation has extended to **24 states nationwide**, fostering sustainable energy solutions for community based organizations (CBOs), funded higher education scholarships for talented youth, provided humanitarian aid in times of crisis, reaffirmed the commitment of our team of employees to the service of their communities.

The reinforcement of our **monitoring and evaluation strategy** has been key to this

evolution. Currently, increasingly accurate and verifiable information is available, enabling us to show the value of each project, the benefits for our allies and, above all, the impact for communities. This evidence-based management has helped **broaden our scope and enhanced the effectiveness of our actions.**

During these **ten years of social impact with tangible results**, the Semptra Infrastructure Foundation has financed over **515 projects**; invested more than **\$335 million pesos**; and benefitted over **one million people**. Thanks to the commitment of our allies, more than **5,100 solar panels** have been installed; preventing the production of more than **1,900 tons of CO₂e**; and generating upwards of **\$10 million pesos** for benefiting organizations. Moreover, **1,200 college-level scholarships** have been awarded; **1,500 treatments against cancer** were financed; and the infrastructure of more than 45 orphanages and senior centers have been refurbished.

We are firm believers that energy equality should be affordable for all sectors of society. With this in mind, we work to

put this in reach for community-based organizations that transform lives every day. By the same token, we believe education is a driving force for social transformation, and a key tool for creating opportunities and strengthening communities.

This conviction translates to a clear strategy that is expressed in four lines of action, our 4Es: **Sustainable Electrification, Education for the Future, Emergency Relief, and Employee Engagement.** Through these efforts, we have consolidated a model of social intervention that is focused, measurable and aligned with the vision of Semptra Infrastructure.

Ten years down the road, I can say with pride that today the Semptra Infrastructure Foundation is a benchmark for the industry, and a reliable ally for those building a more sustainable and more equitable Mexico, with greater possibilities for all. This anniversary of ours not only celebrates what has been achieved; it also reaffirms our conviction of continued, measurable, strategic and long-term impact. **I am more than certain that the best is yet to come.**

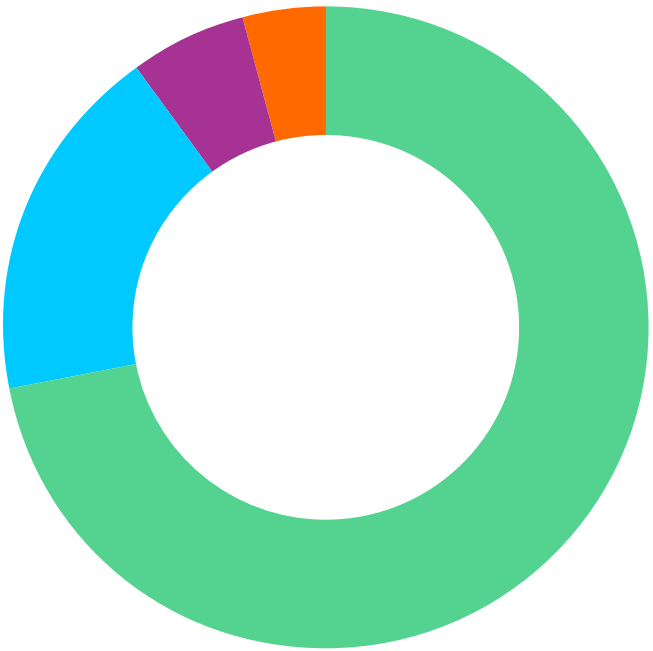

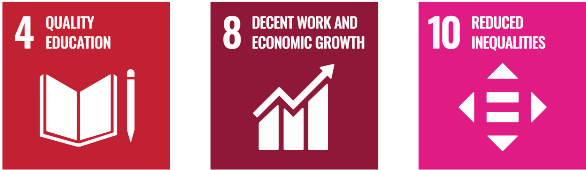

In 2025, we managed our project portfolio through two main approaches.

FIRSTLY, WE CONTINUED SUPPORTING INITIATIVES LED BY ORGANIZATIONS WITH WHICH WE HAVE ESTABLISHED COLLABORATIVE RELATIONSHIPS. AND SECONDLY, WE CARRIED OUT OUR ANNUAL CALL FOR PROPOSALS TO INCORPORATE NEW PROJECTS ALIGNED WITH OUR PRIORITIES. ADDITIONALLY, WE LAUNCHED OUR FIRST RESEARCH AND INNOVATION CALL FOR PROPOSALS, AIMED AT FUNDING INITIATIVES THAT PROMOTE SCIENTIFIC KNOWLEDGE ON RENEWABLE ENERGY AND THE ENERGY TRANSITION.

At the Sempra Infrastructure Foundation, we are convinced that education is a key driver of social development. For this reason, we promote technical and higher education opportunities for young people interested in energy and sustainable development, helping close educational gaps, improve employability in sectors linked to the energy transition and foster social mobility.

In 2025, we incorporated a new category within this area focused on funding research and innovation initiatives that address the energy transition and sustainable development. Two projects were selected to begin activations in 2026, with the goal of promoting low-carbon energy solutions, expanding knowledge on sustainability in upper-secondary education and equipping spaces for research and technological development.

The transition to clean energy offers CBOs the opportunity to operate in a more sustainable, equitable and efficient manner.

Through this line of action, we promote solutions that reduce their dependence on conventional energy sources and lower their operating costs, enabling them to allocate more resources to their core mission: better serving the people and communities they support.

These actions primarily include the installation of solar panels, low-emission mini-split systems, lighting systems and solar water heaters, as well as improvements to electrical infrastructure.

02 Engagement Campaigns

We carried out three social impact campaigns to engage company employees.

Back to school campaign: Back to school campaign consisted of donations to nine organizations participating in the Three-Year Children’s Homes Infrastructure Improvement Program, so that children and youth would have the school supplies and materials needed for the school year.

Our employees contributed 160,625 pesos, which translated into 283 school kits benefiting 283 children and adolescents. In addition, 54 employees participated in the school kit delivery events held at each children’s home.



Kilotón 2025: A binational campaign in SI’s binational campaign in September that aligns with the Hunger Action Month movement in the U.S.

For the campaign involvement in Mexico, the Foundation invited our employees to donated rice and beans, high-demand, staple pantry products which were distributed in food packages to families via local food banks.

In total, 3,873 kilograms of food were donated and matched by Semptra Infrastructure Foundation, representing a 15% increase compared to 2024. This campaign supported the population affected by the floods that occurred in October in Hidalgo.

Holiday giving campaign: Holiday giving campaign which consisted consisted of delivering clothing, footwear and toys to children and teens from nine organizations participating in the Three-Year Foster Home Adoption Program, as part of the Three Kings’ Day celebrations.

A total of 464 employees joined the campaign, benefiting 327 children and teens. Gift delivery events were held with the participation of 142 staff members.

03 Charity Market

In November, we held a bazaar at the corporate offices in Mexico City that brought together five organizations marketing cause-related products. Employee response was outstanding, raising more than 99 thousand pesos in support of the participating projects.

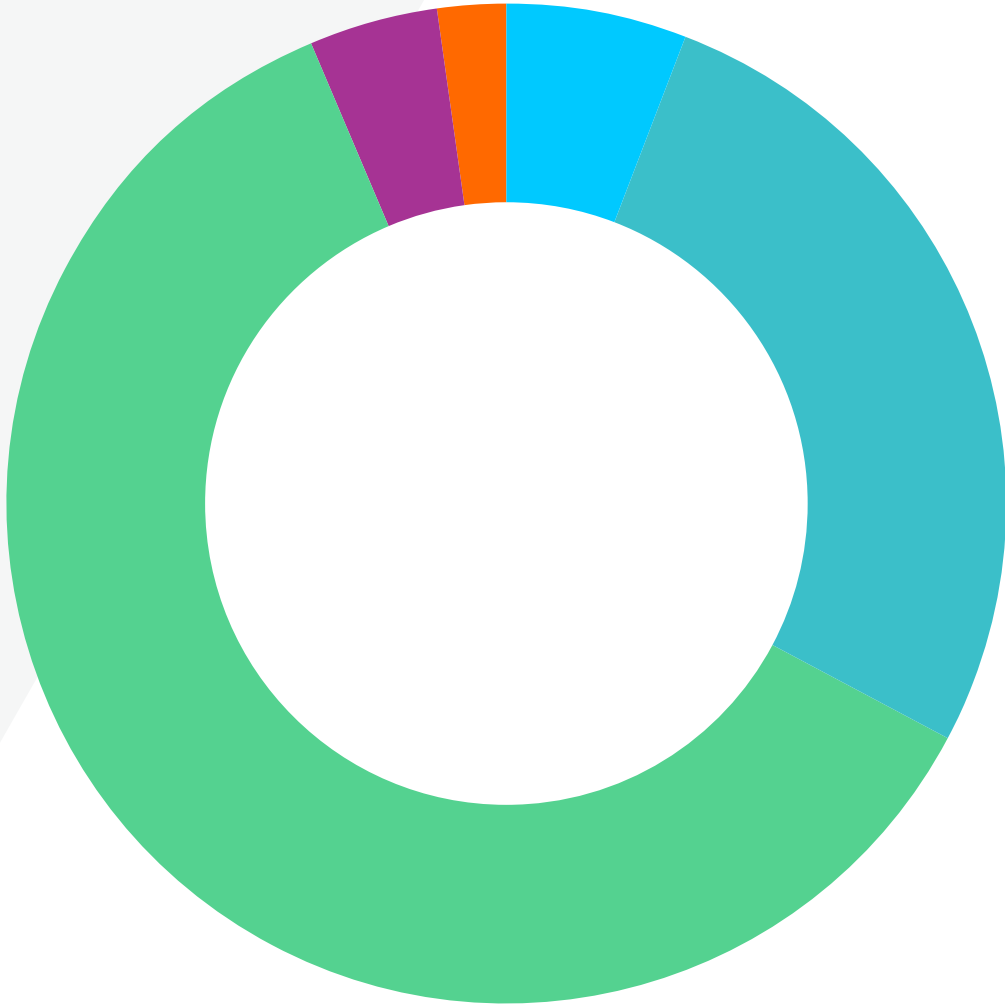
