At the Sempra Infrastructure Foundation, we are committed to improving people's lives by supporting organizations and programs that contribute to the development of the communities we serve and where we work.

In 2022, I'm proud to report that the Sempra Infrastructure Foundation supported 47 projects through 32 organizations.

As part of these projects, we fulfilled our commitment to make donations of \$30.7 million pesos, of which eight million pesos were allocated to continuing our efforts to mitigate the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic in collaboration with another two organizations. To achieve this, we donated medical protection equipment and supplies and contributed to offering mental health aid to medical personnel who were on the frontlines in the battle

against the COVID-19 virus. Likewise, 2022 was a year during which we were once again able to perform in-person activities within our office spaces, enabling us to restart campaigns involving our employees that result in greater contact with the beneficiaries, for which we took the necessary sanitary measures at all times.

My deepest appreciation goes to our partners and allies of these past few years. In collaboration with these organizations, we have been able to develop several projects assisting communities with helping their citizens.

As we look into the future, we have a clear vision of increasing our positive effect in more communities. 2022 was an instrumental year for planning how we want to create this. We have set the groundwork for becoming a key player in the transformation of the lives of people in the communities we serve and where we work.

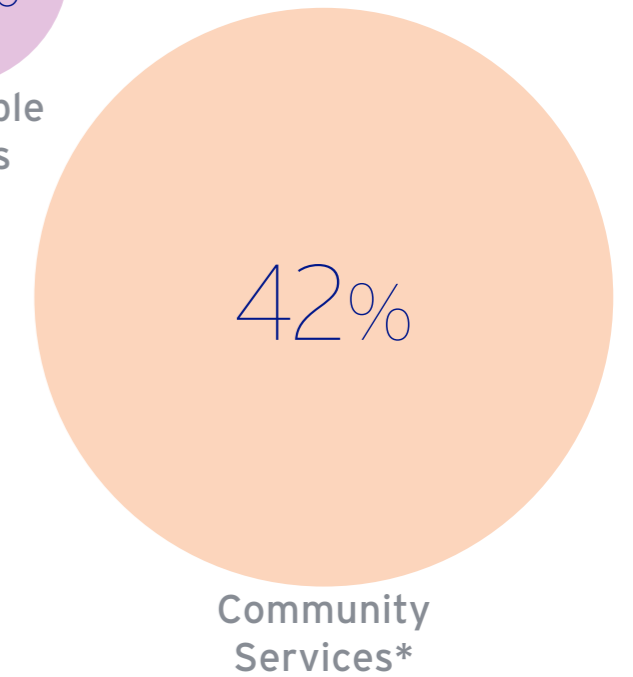

THE COMMITMENT OF OUR EMPLOYEES

To help our employees become aware and involved with causes and institutions that strive to contribute to the social development of the communities where we operate, in 2022 we performed the following activities:



1

Employee fundraising campaign

To benefit the Casa Hogar del Anciano de Ensenada, A.C., we carried out a fundraising campaign through which, thanks to the participation of 78 employees, we raised \$65,900 pesos, which was doubled with the foundation's matching contribution for a total of \$131,800 pesos. The funds were allocated to infrastructure improvements for the organization consisting of building a new bedroom and restroom so that more elderly people could be served.

2

Environmental awareness activities

In the framework of Earth Day, on April 22nd, employees and their families in Ensenada, Baja California, and Monterrey, Nuevo León, participated in environmental awareness activities that included a course on germination and plant production, the presentation entitled "The importance of environmental services", and a day reserved to clean-up efforts in a state park.

3

Community services for youth

Commitment to the well-being of children and adolescents in the eight institutions that are part of the Triannual Foster Home Adoption Program for Infrastructure Improvements. We carried out two campaigns in the year during which our employees helped the children and youngsters by delivering:

Education

- School packages with the supplies they needed to start the school year. 185 employees donated 216,244 pesos to give 197 children and youngsters the supplies they needed for their schoolwork. In 2022 we once again carried out events for delivering these packages, taking all the necessary sanitary measures, and limiting the number of participants. 52 employees participated.
- Clothes, shoes, and toy packages were delivered on Three Kings Day. Our employees got together to give gifts to 182 children and adolescents in six foster homes¹ in January 2023. 81 employees participated in the events during which the gifts were delivered, following strict sanitary measures, and limiting the number of participants.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

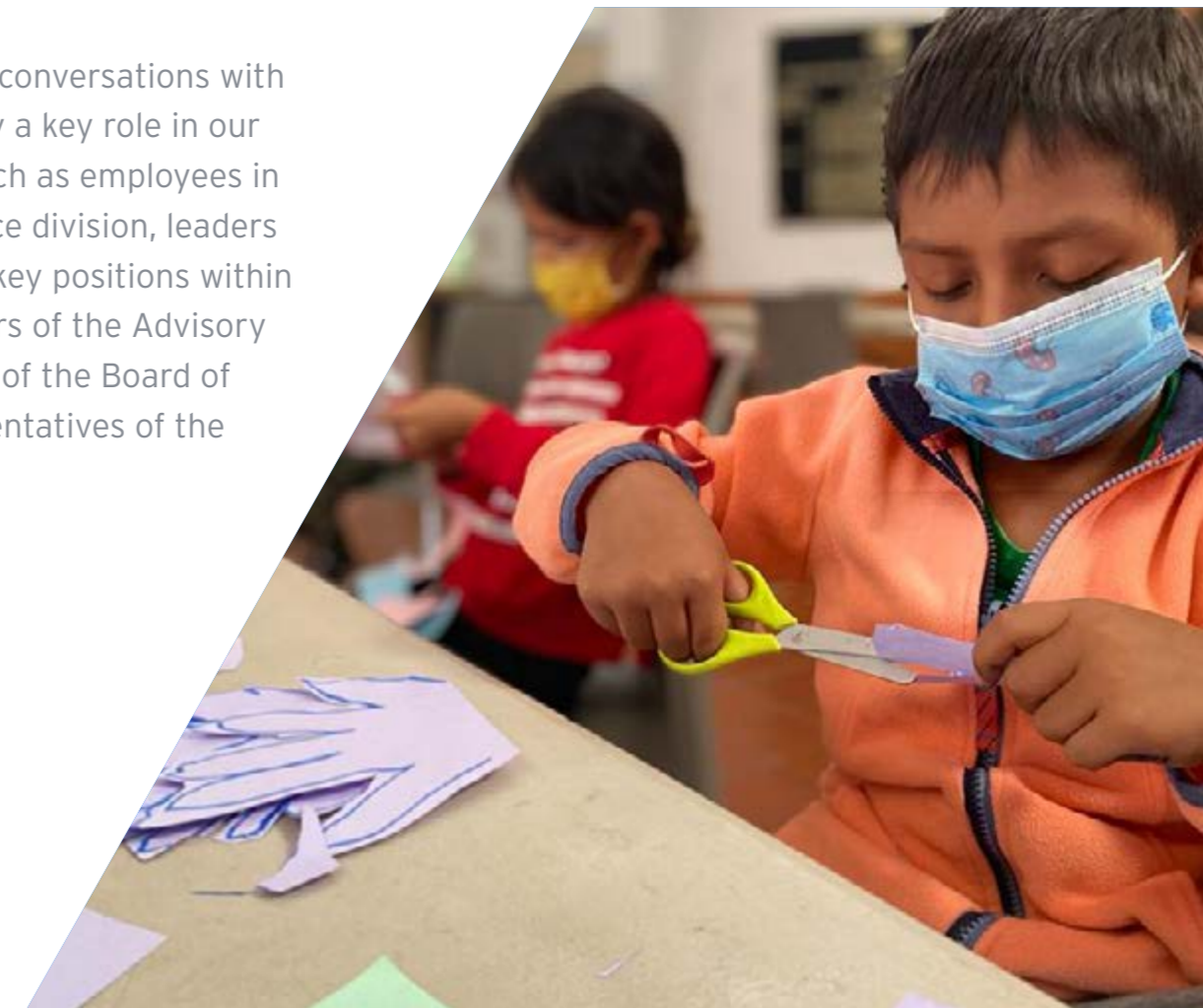
2022 was a year during which we focused on refining our strategic planning to comply with our purpose of achieving greater efficiencies and continue transforming lives.

To strengthen our project and ensure the Foundation's impact, we performed an assessment that took into consideration the trends in strategic philanthropy and social investment, the reality of the communities to which we belong, and our evolution as an organization. To strengthen our strategic social efforts framework, we based our strategy on the principle of systemic thinking that promotes the understanding of the context, as well as the needs and expectations of the most relevant stakeholders in terms of our strategy. We strive to maintain the interdependence between economic, social, and environmental matters to obtain more precise and timely information for the decision-making process in terms of philanthropy and social investment.

Founded on our interest in understanding what is happening around us and getting to know best practices in philanthropy, we performed a benchmarking exercise that applies to the company's business sector.

As part of the effort to understand the internal context, we collaborated with a consulting firm that gained a detailed understanding of our business model, sustainability strategy, and our management system as well as our social investment mechanisms and their most relevant attributes. Likewise, we took into consideration a relevance analysis that justifies our social action efforts and the analytical data regarding our performance to analyze in detail the impact we have had since our inception.

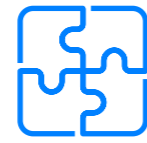
